

Third Person Singular -s Ending

For simple present verbs, the third person singular form has an -s ending. No other simple present forms have this ending.

I connect with my friends.	We connect with our friends.
You connect with your friends.	You connect with your friends.
He connects with his friends.	They connect with their friends.

She connects with her friends.	
Jessie connects with her friends.
